POLL ON RESTRUCTURE: AUGUST 2.

On June 20 the Minister for Local Government, the Honourable J. Simmonds, announced that he had referred to a Division of the Local Government Commission 16 proposals involved in the proposed restructure of Councils in the North Central segment of

The proposals cover alterations to all municipalities in the segment, originally 24 and now increased to 30. The result will be, if the proposals are adopted, a reduction of nearly half in the total number of councils in this part

of the State.

Under the proposals the Government intends that your Shire, the Shire of Metcalfe, will disappear. Instead, new shires based on Castlemaine and Kyneton will be created, each including part of the Metcalfe Shire and parts of other municipalities.

The proposed dividing line, running generally north and south, follows Barty's Road, Jennings Hill Road, Bendigo-Sutton Grange Road, Potts Road, Jennings Hill Road, Bendigo-Sutton Grange Road, Potts Road, the creek which crosses Potts Road south of Phillips Road and the Coliban Main Channel.

Your Council is totally opposed to the proposals, and believes the overwhelming majority of ratepayers and residents will be too. In order to gauge public feeling the Council has directed that a poll will be taken on the day of the Annual Elections, Saturday, August 2. All persons whose names are on the voters' rolls for the five ridings of the Shire are urged to take this opportunity of showing the Minister and the Local Government Commission what they think of their proposal to dismember the Shire and include the two parts with Castlemaine and Kyneton in new, large municipalities.

Previous indications, from public and other meetings and a survey conducted through the December Newsletter, have been that there is very little public support for the Government's proposals. These are summarised in the Commission's Options Paper as follows:

- A capacity to perform a wider range of functions Savings in administration costs. Communitites will be united, not divided, by municipal boundaries

- boundaries.

 More equitable distribution of the costs of providing services.

 Better quality services and administration.

 Greater co-ordination in physical and social planning.

 Increased financial flexibility to meet changing needs.

 Fairer sharing of the burden of rates.

 Greater financial and political autonomy for local government.

The result of the poll will be communicated at once to the Minister and the Commission but will not be binding on them. Nevertheless it will be a solid indication of how the people of this Shire view the

proposals. A council submission has been prepared and lodged with the Commission. In it your Council's concerns are spelled out in detail, and the Minister and the Commission are urged to re-think the proposals. The Council is totally opposed to any form of enforced restructure, believing that the people of the Shire have the right to self-determination. The will of the people, expressed through a poll, should be paramount.

Hundreds of Shire people have individually notified the Commission that they intend to make oral submissions at the public hearing.

It seems that the Minister and the Local Government Commission believe that small municipalities must be uneconomical, inefficient and ineffective, but by restructuring them into larger units they will become more efficient and effective. Not only that, but they claim that the money saved overall by reduced administration costs will pay for new services. The Minister has not said what those added responsibilities might be; only that they will be devolved to restructured municipalities, which will be given more powers and more money for the purpose, when the Government has worked out the details of its social justice strategy.

To your Council, the idea of the destruction of the Shire, which has existed for 126 years, is unthinkable.

The Council believes the Government's move is largely a means of gaining more control over local government. It can see no advantages, only disadvantages, from the restructure of municipalities generally, and the Shire of Metcalfe in particular.

Some of the disadvantages your Council can see for Metcalfe ratepayers and residents are: It seems that the Minister and the Local Government Commission

- Complete loss of identity as a Shire and as a people.
 Loss of control over their own affairs.
 Forced union with other areas having different needs and priorities.
 Increased rates, no savings to buy new services.
 Reduction in existing services, except at higher cost.

- Loss of effective representation on new councils.

 Municipal offices more remote from most people.

 Party politics to the fore in council matters.

 More impersonal service.

 Neglect of outlying areas.

 Slowing of development; tighter development controls.

 Bigger, more impersonal bureaucracy with which to deal.

If major restructuring occurs, all affected municipalities will be abolished and new municipalities created in their place. The only exceptions will be areas where only minor boundary changes are

This mean that all former councillors and staff will go out of office, and new elections and appointments will be necessary.

MAJOR MITCHELL TREK 150 Years Celebration

One Hundred and Fifty years ago the first known white men to set foot on what was to become the Shire Of Metcalfe's soil were Major Thomas Mitchell and his

exploration party.

To celebrate this historic event, a Major Mitchell Ball and a Major Mitchell Trek have been organised.

The Major Mitchell Colonial Ball will be held at the Sutton Grange Hall on October 3

The Major Mitchell Trek will follow as close to the original 45km route and begin at 9.30 on Saturday October 4. It will leave Castlemaine, passing through Chewton, Faraday, Sutton Grange and finishing at Redesdale where a commemorative plaque will be unveiled.

It is estimated that a few hundred horse riders, horse drawn jinkers, at least one Cobb & Co. Coach and vintage vehicles will take part, along with many cyclists and walkers.

People are encouraged to dress in period costume. The cost to join in the event is \$20-adult,\$15-child, \$50-family, which includes lunch, afternoon tea, B.B.Q. (spit roasts), campfire, Bush dance admission, overnight camp and breakfast. Those wishing to camp overnight will return to Castlemaine via Elphinstone next day.

The Bush dance will feature the 'Fossikers Colonial Bush Band'. For those who don't join the trek but wish to enjoy the B.B.Q. and dance the cost is \$10.

All fees must be paid a fortnight in advance

A painting by well known Castlemaine Artist, Alan Sartori, of the Coliban Falls, admired by Major Mitchell in his journal, will be raffled during the evening. Second prize will be three bottles of 'Major Mitchell' tawny port from the Romany Rye Vineyard at Redesdale. 6 glasses will accompany this prize. Commemorative glasses displaying Major Mitchell's portrait will be available.

C.E.P. Projects

A number of project's will be carried out this year with the aid of the Commonwealth Employ-ment Programme.

Council has recently improved the alignment of the northern approach to Doyles Bridge on the Kyneton-Metcalfe Rd., but further work is needed to be done along Snodgrass Creek to ensure the security of the bridge. the bridge.

Under the C.E.P. project, the problems along Snodgrass Creek will be rectified. In its present condition the risk of erosion is a major threat and in severe circumstances it could mean the loss of Doyles Bridge. Reinforcing is also needed to protect the bridge.

Other C.E.P. projects include roadside clearing, such as the removal of fallen and low hanging branches and the clearing of undergrowth.

Under the Local Government Commission's philosophy, Metcalfe Shire's total population would only warrant a maximum of two councillors! With the power bases elsewhere, there seems little likelihood of local councillors being able to exert any great influence over the affairs of the new councils.

The referendum on August 2 is regarded as an informal poll, but is the only opportunity which will be given to the people of the Shire as a whole to say what they collectively think of the proposed destruction of the Shire.

After the public hearing by the Commission of the 16 proposals.

After the public hearing by the Commission of the 16 proposals, commencing at Eaglehawk on July 22, the Commission will submit its recommendations to the Minister. If the Minister agrees that the Shire of Metcalfe should go, the ratepayers and residents in the two parts of the Shire will be able to demand that those proposals be submitted to a formal poll. However, it will be only the people in the proposed new municipalities who will be eligible to vote, at that stage on the respective proposals.

This means that the votes from Metcalfe Shire people could be swamped by those of people in other parts of the proposed new

waniped by those of people in other parts of the proposed new municipalities.

However, no matter what is the result, the Minister need not be bound by it. The Local Government Act requires the Minister to have regard to the result but, having done that, he can ignore it and make his own decision.

The ballot paper you will receive on polling day will read like this:

The Local Government Commission proposes that the Shire of Metcalfe be abolished and that parts of the Shire be added to new municipalities to be based on Castlemaine and Kyneton.



SHIRE **PRESIDENTS** REPORT

Cr. Shirley Archbold, the first lady President in the Shire of Metcalfe, will end her term in August.

Cr. Archbold was asked to recall the highlights of the past year and to inform ratepayers and residents what it was like to be Shire President.

Cr. Archbold said:

'During my time as the Metcalfe Shire President I was asked to represent the Shire at numerous functions - annual and public meetings, recept-ions, dinners, openings and

campaigns.
Two of the events that stand out most in my mind were the reception for Prince Charles and Princess Diana at the National Gallery of Victoria, and a garden party reception at Government House for Queen Elizabeth and

Prince Philip.
Closer to home, the Australia Day Celebrations in Metcalfe, Day Celebrations in Metcalfe, included a flag raising ceremony; Mr. Ken Wright, M.L.C. (N.W. Province) as speaker; Citizen of the Year , awarded to Mr. Lindsay of Chewton; and the presentation of the Victorian flag to the council.

The opening of Ellery Park, Chewton (a Victorian 150th Birthday Project), in September 1985 was also an important occasion for myself and the Shire.

My Presidential function this My Presidential function this year took the form of a Civic Church Service. Approximately 200 people gathered at the Chewton Uniting Church. The Chewton School children performed the items which were enjoyed by all.

I have attended many, many meetings, some of which included: Formal Planning Council Sub-committee, Local Government Commission, Bendigo Road funding day, Metcalfe Bicentennial Committee, Planning Scheme meetites,

ittee, Planning Scheme meetings and sixteen Anti Amalgamation meetings.

seen during my year as Sime President. Finally, I wish to thank all the Council indoor and outdoor staff for the help they have given me throughout my term.


Councillor Resigns

Cr. Donald Cant, who has been on the Metcalfe Council

been on the Metcalfe Council for ten years, recently resigned due to poor health.

Cr. Cant wished the Council well in its forthcoming battles with the Government's restructuring of boundaries and said it was with great regret that he was forced to resign.

Mr. D.H. McGregor has been elected to fill the vacancy caused by Cr. Cant's resignation.



September 1836.

They travelled from Newstead that morning on the Major's 'Third Expedition', passed the site of Castlemaine, via the present Gaol Hill, and crossed a 'considerable stream' (Barkers considerable stream' (Barkers Creek) at a point just where it is now spanned by the bridge near the railway station subway. They moved over the present Kennedy Street near the Midlands Hotel, over Barker Street, and across the site of Tonks Bros. timber yard, going on over Hargraves and Campbell Sts., Urquhart and Doveton Sts., Fletcher and Berkeley Sts. The party passed close to the north of Kalimna Park and camped at Dogleg Gully, now part of the Moonlight Flat Pine Plantation.

Major Mitchell left the others in search of the hill he had so long seen before him and which he called Mt. Byng (Mt. Alexander).

"A country fully as promising as the fine region we had left, was embraced in my view from that point', he wrote when he returned to camp that evening.

'The range before us was certainly formidable for the passage of carts, but home lay beyond it; and delay and famine were synonymous terms with us at that time'. On the 29th they followed the valley from where they had camped and 'overturned a cart through bad driving". The ravine opened into a grassy valley with a 'fine rivulet (Forest Creek) flowing through it.' through it.

through it.'
His journal continued: "The Pass, so auspiciously discovered and opened, over a neck apparently the very lowest of the whole range, I named Expedition Pass, confident that such a line of communication between the southern coast and Sydney, must, in the course of time, become a very considerable thoroughfare.'

Having travelled only four miles from their last camp, and crossed the present Calder Hwy., they encountered rotten and boggy ground. Once bogged, a bolt of the boat carriage gave way and they were forced to make camp there.

While awaiting the repairs to the boat carriage Mitchell decided to visit Mt. Macedon, 30 miles to the South. When he returned to camp on the 1st Oct. the boat carriage was fixed but

the boat carriage was fixed but on Sunday 2nd the weather was bad so they rested 'for the benefit of our jaded horses, not withstanding our short rations.'

The party resumed their journey on 3rd October keeping clear of boggy ground.
Mitchell wrote: "We crossed several fine valleys, each watered by a running stream, and all the hills consisted of granite'.

They crossed various streams running south from Mt. Alexander to the Coliban, which runs north, through a deeper valley in which there were very few trees, the hills on the opposite side being 'uncommonly level' at the top.

The Major Mitchell route passed near Blackfellow's Gate on the Sutton Grange - Elphinstone road, and from Eileen Donan (a property) at Blackfellows Gate, north - easterly, trekking on higher ground across Jennings Creek near the present Coliban Park homestead.

They eventually crossed the

They eventually crossed the Coliban River and camped on the opposite bank, after finding a ford and with great difficulty crossing their carts, 'so abrupt and steep is the ravine in which this river flows'.

He wrote enthusiastically 'Hearing a noise of falling water, I rode towards it, and thus came to a very fine cascade of upwards of 60ft. The river indeed fell double that height, but in the lower part the water escaped unseen flowing be-tween large blocks of granite. I had visited several water falls in Scotland, but this was certainly the most picturesque I had witnessed, although the effect was not so much in the body of water falling as in the bold character of the rocks over which it fell. Their colour and character of the rocks over which it fell. Their colour and shape were harmonised into a more complete scene than nature usually presents, resembling the finished work of an artist, foreground and all. The prevailing hues were light red and purple grey, the rocks being finely interlaced with small leaved creeper of the brightest green. A dark coloured moss which presents a warm green in the sun, covered the lower masses, and relieved and supported the brighter hues, while a brilliant iris shone steadily in the spray and blended into perfect harmony the lighter hues of the higher rocks, and the whiteness of the torrent rushing over them. The banks of this stream are so bold banks of this stream are so bold a character, that in all probability other picture scenery, perhaps finer than this, may yet be found upon it.'

Mitchell was Major Major Mitchell was so intrigued by the scenic beauty of these falls that, although anxious to proceed, he could not resist the temptation to delay awhile and make a sketch

On October 5th he crossed another river running north, at the present site of Redesdale, named it 'Campaspe' and travelled on, leaving behind what was to become the Shire of Metcalfe.

Bicentennial Update
